
YEAR 7 AND 8 Students at work Nga akonga i te mahi



Remember,


Hot sand beneath your feet, burning your toes.

In 2015 Tuakau College began assessing its Year Seven and Eight students using a Junior College Diploma. The following information explains how the system works!

At the end of Year Eight the students will be awarded a Junior College Diploma based on their academic performance at the curriculum level that they are working on. Students will be assessed using the Key Competencies in each subject that they are studying.

Each term, the subjects that the student is studying will have twenty points on offer. The exception is their whanau report which only offers ten points. The first two Key Competencies relate to the Knowledge and Skills of the subject, Using Language, Symbols and Text (or Practical Skills if it is Art or PE) and Thinking and adds up to 10 points.

The last three Key Competencies relate to the self-management skills of the student and fall into the following categories; Relating to Others, Managing Self and Participating and contributes 10 points. Each subject area will have decided on the self-management skills that are important for success.

At the end of the term all the points that the student has gained will be added up and students will receive a points update, which will show how well the student is achieving using a grade point average. In order to achieve a Silver grade, students need a grade point average of at least 75 and for Gold, a grade average of 85 or higher. Students achieving Bronze will need a grade point average of 50 to 74.

Whanau reports will reward students with points for their extra-curricular activities and willingness to help others in whanau as well as house competitions. Wearing the correct uniform will also be a way of gaining quality points. Two full school reports and two progress reports will be issued during the year.

The full reports will be issued in Week 10, Term 2 and Week 10, Term 4. Progress reports will be issued at the end of Term 1 and on the last day of Term 3. Students will receive a table of criteria on how to get the points for each subject and this will be placed in a part of their workbooks or booklets that are easily accessible and where teachers will be able to explain to the students what they need to do to be successful.

In Summary:

- 20 points awarded in each subject each term
- Whanau reports will award 10 points each term
- Students will receive two full reports and two progress reports
- Each student will have a rubric for each subject they are studying in the term based on the Key Competencies
- Students must achieve two thirds of the credits available
- Bronze GPA 50-74
- Silver GPA 75-84
- Gold GPA 85-100



COVID-19 UPDATE

Following the information you have already received, either by email, Facebook or the website, here is an update on COVID-19. Tuakau College has and will be doing a number of things to prevent the spread of Covid-19 such as:

- Constant reminders about hand washing and social distancing of at least a metre. Students not to share food or drink.
- We have ensured that surfaces where students have worked were sanitised after each period.
- Please encourage your child to wash their hands thoroughly and correctly. Soap and water for 20 seconds minimum is best. Hands must be dried completely. Students are supposed to keep a distance of 1.5 m away from each other. As this is impractical in a school, students just need to be aware of distances between themselves and others. Students should refrain from handshakes, hongi, kissing, etc as part of this strategy.

The students had to analyse risks that could occur while kayaking and demonstrate risk management strategies. They paddled to Te Muri Beach where they set up their campsites and cooked a range of meals on gas cookers. On day two, the sea become slight, which provided a safe challenge and some fun for many of the students.

Recently, students from the Year 13 Outdoor Education class went on a four day adventure camp at the top of the Coromandel Peninsula. The class looked at risks and safety management issues that might occur from the time the left school to the time they returned.
