We were fortunate enough to get the new Confidence Course erected within one week and had the official blessing by our Kaumatua, Mr Miki Graham on Wednesday, 12 May. Students were taken through a full risk analysis during the Physical Education periods, prior to the confidence course being opened. We would like to stress that this is not a playground and careless use of the equipment can result in serious injury. We therefore ask all users to adhere to safety requirements for using the course. Signage has been erected to advise users of these safety requirement.

We are pleased to announce that we have received an additional grant that will allow us to erect the second part of the confidence course.

During Week Three, we placed a huge focus on bullying by being part of NZ Bully-Free Week. Students were spoken to at assembly about bullying and the effects of it. They also learnt about it in some of their classes. Part of the Bully-Free Week was getting Mike King, New Zealander of the Year 2019 and a NZ Mental Health advocate to offer up his time to present to approximately 200 members of our Tuakau Community. His presentation on Tuesday 18 May was well received by all who attended.

As part of Bully-Free Week we also took part in Pink Shirt Day to take a stand against bullying. It was great to see the staff decked out in the pink shirts with most wearing the official pink shirt with the slogan – Speak Up, Stand Together, Stop Bullying – Korero Mai, Korero Atu, Mauri Tū, Mauri Ora. We appeal to all of our community to take a stand against bullying and to speak up when they witness it.

A focus of this term is to ensure that students are in class, learning. In order for that to occur, we need to stress that school starts at 9:00am on a Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday and at 9:10am on a Wednesday. Students who continually arrive late will incur consequences, so to avoid the consequence for lateness, students need to be on time to school. Being on time has a significant impact on the learning outcomes experienced by your child each day.

Finally, on a sad note, we farewelled an ex-staff member on 18 May. Mr Warren Riwai passed away on Monday, 10 May after a short illness. Mr Riwai is survived by his wife, Mrs Meg Riwai, also an ex-staff member, and a large extended whānau. Mr Riwai was a big part of our Tuakau College whānau and we will miss him dearly. VAPING

Vaping is the act of heating a liquid, then inhaling and exhaling an aerosol (often referred to as vapour) from an electronic vaporiser device. Sounds basic, right? Well, not so much.

Principals are alarmed at the growing number of students who vape, with one saying children as young as 13 are using the cigarette substitutes. <u>Teachers are confiscating more and more vaping devices, which can be as small as a USB pen drive and are hard to detect.</u>

The aerosol or 'vapour' that is produced from these devices is created through heating a 'juice' or e-liquid inside a cartridge within the device. The 'juice' generally contains a propylene glycol or vegetable glycerine base, and also usually contains flavourings (many juices also have nicotine). Once heated, this juice is transformed into an aerosol which is inhaled from the device then exhaled, giving the appearance of smoke or 'vape clouds'.'

These come in many forms such as e-cigs, vape pens, pods, pipes, and tanks (also known as 'mods' which can be customised by the user). Scientists, doctors, and the vaping industry are still learning about the health effects of vaping.

This means that there's still a lot that we don't know about vaping, and the risk to your health. <u>Smoking</u> <u>cigarettes was considered 'safe' in the 50's, and look how that turned out.</u> Essentially, the long-term effects are still largely unknown, but here's what we know so far:

INHALING THE UNKNOWN

E-cigarette and vaping aerosol generally contain fewer harmful chemicals than the smoke from traditional tobacco cigarettes. However, some e-cigarette aerosols contain tiny particles that reach deep into the lungs. These particles may have chemicals in them that irritate the lungs. Over time, these chemicals can potentially cause cancer, increase inflammation in the lung and lead to other lung diseases. Young people are especially at risk. Putting weird unknown chemicals into your body at this stage is even worse than it is for adults, because you're still developing. We know there are physical effects from smoking as a teen, so who knows how vaping as a teenager could affect your body?

HAZARDOUS CHEMICALS

The liquids in vapes, by the way, can sometimes burn skin just through contact. They can also rapidly cause nicotine poisoning if swallowed. Now, you're probably not going to drink it, but a baby brother or sister might, and it could literally (yes, LITERALLY) kill them. Vape devices also, if modified incorrectly, can explode. Yes it's happened, and it's not pretty.

E-CIGARETTE, OR VAPING PRODUCT USE ASSOCIATED LUNG INJURY (EVALI)

Vape use has been linked to severe lung disease (EVALI) that has led to hospitalisations in more than 2500 people across the United States, with over 60 reported deaths. Some cases of EVALI included teenagers and young adults using vapes that contained cannabis (tetrahydrocannabinol, THC) or Vitamin E oil. The highest risk seemed to be from vapes obtained from the illicit market. Vaping, and second hand vape, can also impact on other respiratory conditions such as asthma, and have been found to increase coughing and worsen asthma symptoms, especially among young people.



VAPING AND YOUR HEART

Vaping and e-cigarettes can raise your blood pressure, heart rate, and can change your heart's function.

At Tuakau College, vaping is treated the same as smoking (<u>including on</u> <u>school buses</u>). The consequences are therefore as follows:

- First offence: After School Detention
- Second offence: Meeting with Parents and After School Detention
- Third offence: Community Service
- Fourth offence: Treated as Continual Disobedience and therefore a stand-down




A word from Mr. Mitchell (Head of Performing Arts Department):



Te Whare Ako is the new and rejuvenated area of the school which now occupies the rooms opposite the tennis courts on the Buckland Road entrance. It has been quite a change in environment from the old Te Whaanau building.

We have also gained extra staffing with the merge of Teaching Assistants and the addition of an Assistant SENCO, Mrs Shirley Scott, who also teaches in the Science Department.

While our main aim is to address the moderate learning needs within the school, we particularly focus on the additional needs of individual students.

In addition to the Learning aspect we also provide a wellness area for all students to access. This was established last year through the generosity and support of The Mind Health Project and Ministry funding. This is proving to be an asset to the school.

We are also a member of the Guidance team within Tuakau College and work within a team environment for the benefit of all our students. Housed also within our walls is the ESOL Department. Mrs Hucker



ESOL means "English for Speakers of Other Languages." Our ESOL teacher is Mrs Lang. She formally assesses oral language, reading and writing ability twice a year to gain the present level of English Language attainment and their 'next steps' to improve.

Our ESOL programme is based on helping students with their school subjects and most importantly the "English Language Learning Progressions." This is an English language programme for school students who do not have English as their first language, from the New Zealand Ministry of Education, and it is widely used in schools throughout New Zealand. We focus on three different levels of ability and students move through the levels as their English skills improve and their confidence increases
