## ARE WE READY FOR ANOTHER LOCKDOWN IF IT COMES? Kua rite taatau mo tetahi kati ano mena ka tae mai?

Tuakau College wants our students and wider community to know we are prepared for another lockdown if it comes. ERO continues to investigate the impacts of COVID-19 on schools and shared its interim report findings (based on interviews with 110 schools and 95 early learning services and insights from the Māori medium education sector).

The key findings were:

- Staff wellbeing is the biggest concern three-quarters of schools reported challenges related to exhaustion, sickness, stress about workload, anxiety about health, or principal stress
- Learner wellbeing has been the priority nearly three-quarters of schools reported prioritizing learner wellbeing over academic learning during lockdown. Many reported deferring planned assessments
- · Lower-decile schools are facing more challenges transitioning students back to school
- A quarter of schools reported financial concerns.

**Being prepared.** Two-thirds of the schools reported that they had successfully prepared for lockdown. Factors associated with schools who reported being prepared included using digital technology as an established part of their teaching practice and having up-to-date contact details for learners and whānau. Tuakau College ensures our teachers get professional development on digital technology each year and also ask that all students families please keep their contact details up to date so we can contact them easily.

**Support from MoE and others.** Nearly half of leaders expressed positive feedback about MoE's communications and bulletins, while noting that it was often difficult to keep up with the quantity of guidance, and the pace of change as the situation developed. The distribution of digital devices was challenging, but leaders were positive about MoE's physical learning packs. Tuakau College have been thankful for the support from the Ministry and from our wider school community and students which has helped us put plans in place for further lockdowns.

**Strong communications.** Many leaders reported that regular communication helped to build teacher relationships with whānau and gave whānau greater insight into their children's learning. Teachers used a combination of phone calls, emails, video calling and other digital platforms to regularly check in with learners and whānau. Tuakau College strives to have effective communication with all students and their families through email, Facebook, the school app, website and more.

**Prioritising wellbeing.** Seventy percent of leaders reported that they had explicitly prioritised learner wellbeing over academic learning during lockdown. Tuakau College recognised that they could not expect the normal level of engagement and workload during lockdown and made it clear to learners and whānau that learning was second to wellbeing. We also modified our curriculum to incorporate this.

We ask that you please remember the following things; particularly washing your hands regularly and using the COVID-19 app!

# a little bit Usout Tuakau College

#### TUAKAU/TŪĀKAU (Two-a-coe) meaning:

Today, in many publications, Tuakau is written as TŪĀKAU. The source of this interpretation is from the NZ History archives. The interpretation is 'Tuu Aakau' (Tūākau.) 'Tū' - to stand; ākau - river bank shore. So it means to stand on the river bank. Tuakau College is part of North Waikato and is affiliated to Tainui and the kingitanga movement. King Tuhetia Potatau Tawhiao is presently the Māori king residing at Turangawaewae Ngaruawahia. Taupiri is te maunga (the mountain), Waikato te Awa (the river), Turangawaewae te marae and Tainui te iwi (the tribe).

#### KO WAI TATOU: Who are we?

Over the past years Tuakau College has developed into a modern learning environment which has strengthened and continued to value and enhance things Maaori. Maaoritanga is part of what we do at Tuakau College. What we do is called the Tuakau College Culture or Kawa. Treaty of Waitangi obligations ensure that we continue to recognise and provide a context for all our students, especially our Maaori students.

Our kawa has been a strength of the College since the foundations were laid down by the first Principal, Hiwi Tauroa. He was a visionary leader and the practical steps he put in place towards the school becoming bicultural were implemented before the school opened in 1974. This ensured we followed certain protocols under a cultural umbrella which we cherish, relish and build on as we move forward.

Tuakau College is culturally rich. When we write in Maaori we can use the macron to emphasis a long sound. In Tainui dialect, instead of using a macron a double vowel is used. So, Maori is written Māori or you will see it as Maaori. Here is a little insight into the symbols and rituals of the College.



#### **LOGO and MOTTO**

The logo depicts the fronds of the ponga tree which symbolise nurture, growth and new beginnings for a school relatively young. The larger fronds are the caregivers, staff and parents. The smaller fronds are the students developing and surrounded by the larger fronds for protection and support. The two colours reflect the dual heritage of New Zealand.

The motto "The very best in all things, Pai rawa atu i nga mea katoa," was created by Hiwi Tauroa, the founding Principal. He says "working well is not sufficient - we desire that you produce the very best work you are able to. We will demand the very best performance from each individual. Poor performance is not failure, a lack of effort is. A low standard of achievement resulting from best effort is success."

#### PŌWHIRI

W STORY

A powhiri is an official welcome to our visitors. The tangatawhenua (people of the land) are welcoming to their place the manuhiri (visitors). If the visitors are from overseas then they are the manuhiri tuarangi. Each visitor is 'tapu' (sacred) and the poowhiri is about lifting the tapu and making the visitors part of the school.

The poowhiri starts with 'karanga' where the kuia (older women) call to the manuhiri, for them to come and enter the place where they are going to be welcomed. The visitors will karanga back to the tangatawhenua.

Usually, the visitors are challenged (wero) by a warrior with a taiaha (weapon) and a token of some sort (usually a small branch is laid down for the manuhiri). The manuhiri pick up the token, indicating they come in peace.

At school we do not do this, but the manuhiri are confronted with a haka poowhiri. Once the manuhiri arrive into the whare, or onto the paepae (the place in front of the wharenui - meeting house), everyone stays standing until the haka poowhiri is completed and a karakia (prayer) is given to bless the proceedings.

The speeches (whaikoorero) begin. In Tainui they have alternate speakers. Tangatawhenua speak first then manuhiri. The speakers alternate. After each speech a waiata (song) is sung, usually led by the kuia.

The last manuhiri speaker will lay down a koha for the tangatawhenua. This indicates to the tangatawhenua that they have no more speakers. The koha is accepted and thanks is given. The tangatawhenua then invite the visitors to come forward and be welcomed personally with a hongi (touching of the noses).

#### Kaiarahi Kaiarahi: Guidance Counsellors

Our Guidance Counsellors are Mr Paul Heta and Miss Zoe Saunders and they are located in Te Whaanau. If students/parents/staff want to access the Guidance Counsellors during school hours, students can fill in a referral form and they will be seen. Students can also be referred by a teacher or a parent.

If our Guidance Counsellors cannot work with the student, they have access to other counsellors who we bring into school to support our students.

Every state and state-integrated school and kura in New Zealand has a board of trustees that governs it. The board of trustees is a Crown entity.



## SCHOOL MAP 2021 Mahere Kura 2021

There are some changes to the School Map for 2021, particularly the location of our Student Centre. Our Student Centre is now located on the edge of the Elizabeth Street car park (where B5 used to be). Parents and students are to go here for any enquiries or information. The new Deans room is also located in the new Student Centre. Any students sent to the Dean, or parents wanting to speak/meet with the Dean are to go to the new Student Centre.



#### NO ACCESS TO THE SCHOOL VIA PADDOCKS Kaore he urunga ki te kura ma nga paamu

There will be no access to Tuakau College across the paddock from Jellicoe, Gibson Road, etc to Tuakau College from Thursday 11 February, 2021. The paddock is a working farm and under the Health and Safety Act students should not be using this access. Signs indicating this will be up. The land is leased and the leasers are concerned about the students using this area, especially when cattle are in the paddock. They are liable for any incidents that occur in this area, hence access has to be denied.

Students will have to use Elizabeth Street to get to school. **Students are not to cut through Private properties.** It is unfortunate but it is the law and we are requesting that students and their families abide by the new rulings.

## 2021 Period times and timetable 2021 Te Wā Wahanga me te Waeaki

Our period times/timetable is a 29-period teaching timetable. This is part of Tuakau College's improvement on curriculum delivery. Each teaching period is 50 minutes long and there is two periods after lunch.

Lunch will be at 1 pm daily, except Wednesdays when it will be 12:45 pm. Interval starts at 10:50 am.

Wednesday has a different time structure. On Wednesday school starts at 9:10am, NOT 9:00am. This is going to allow the school to run extended whānau once every four weeks. Period 4 on a Wednesday is for Assembly/Year Level Assembly/House Assemblies and will be 30 minutes long.

We will be finishing school at 3:30 pm daily, except for Wednesdays when we will finish at 3:25 pm.


